




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
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
Message from the Director General


all readers into their daily lives.




Tip: When applying for patent, you must remember to include application fees and patent examination fees with your completed form. If the patent examination is successful, an additional certification fee and subsequent annuities must also be paid. If an application does not meet the requirements for patent, the application will be rejected or, if previously approved, revoked. Therefore, to avoid waste of time and money, patent applicats should thoroughly search all relevant databases and technical reports in Taiwan before submitting a completed application. This way, invention can be modified and patent scope can be amended in a timely manner to avoid unnecessary delays.

Tip:Since patent applications are very technical and complicated procedures, applicants will often seek the assistance of patent agents to handle this process. The more claims drafted in your application, the broader your scope of protection will be. However, the following three specifications must be followed for the application to be successful: 1) you must draft claims which fulfill the purpose of your invention; 2) all claims must be supported by the description and drawings of the invention, and; 3) the scope of claims may not contain prior art or skill.




















Tip: Just as fingerprints are unique representations of an individual, trademarks are also distinct marks which set apart individual goods or services from others. They are a type of intellectual property and are valuable tools used in advertisements, developed through considerable time, cost and effort. Only through the protection of trademarks can we feel safe in enjoying the best quality products and services.



Tip:Trademarks are important bridge between consumers, industries, and the products they represent. Consumers can use trademarks to distinguish between different brands of a product; industries can use trademarks when advertising their products to increase visibility and sales; and the products themselves are helped by trademarks, as a trademark can signify and guarantee the guality and standard of a particular brand and help establish its reputation in the marketplace.












Tip: Once you complete any creative work, the copyright belongs to you. But there are cases in which you may choose to transfer all or part of this copyright to a third party in return for a suitable fee or royalties. But be aware: once this copyright is transferred away, these rights are permanently relinquished to the third party!









Tip: With the worldwide spread of the Internet and rising download speeds, pirated goods can now be produced and sold online more quickly and easily than ever. Once these goods enter the market, sales of original goods will be affected; the creators and investors of these original works therefore earn little in return for their hard work and input. Remember, no matter how insignificant the gain, selling pirated goods online is serious infringement!













Tip: Under "fair use" provisions of the Copyright Act, portions of textbooks may be legally photocopied without permission as long as these portions do not compose a large percentage of the entire book and could not be used to replace the original books in the market-place. However, photocopying of the whole or majority of these textbooks would not meet the definition of "fair use", and would therefore be considered copyright infringement.









Tip: With the ease and speed of online information sharing, Internet users can now regularly enjoy original articles, music and videos produced by others on the Web. In order to preserve and guarantee the rights of these creative artists, Taiwan's Copyright Act states that creators of original works hold exclusive rights to post these works on blogs or website for public viewing, reading or listening. Those wishing to make use of these works must first obtain legal authorization from the right holder and adhere to the "user pay" and "authorized use" systems present in the marketplace.











Tip: Did you know that bit torrent and peer-to-peer (P2P) software is not in itself illegal? If proper authorization or permission is granted before using point-to-point communications such as these to download or share files, then these actions are not considered copyright infringement. However, unauthorized file-sharing is not only illegal, but severely cuts into movie ticket and music album sales. This creates a domino effect which ultimately harms consumers, as struggling movie and music industries will cut production and give the public less to enjoy in the future!

Tip: Taiwan's Copyright Act offers protection for 11 types of works: oral and literary works, musical works, dramatic and choreographic works, artistic works, photographic works, pictorial and graphical works, audiovisual works, sound recordings, architectural works, computer programs, and performances. Before using any of these works previously created by others, we must be sure our actions can be considered "fair use". If not, we must first obtain authorization from the copyright holder to avoid risk of prosecution.











Tip: Displaying architectural works (including photos and postcards) long-term in public outdoor venues such as sidewalks, parks, or outside buildings is not a violation of Copyright Act provided such items are not exact replicas, are not for long-term display, and proper identification of the building being replicated is easily visible.
